Materials Needed

A list of common book characters, such as Curious George, Froggy, Fly Guy, and The Very Hungry Caterpillar

Vocabulary

How to do it:

- 1** Introduce the greeting: “Today we are going to greet each other like book characters. You will get to make noises and do motions so you will also have to show a lot of self-control.”
- 2** Brainstorm some book characters and some sounds and motions to go with them. For example, for Curious George, students might say “ooo-aaaa” while scratching at their ribs.
- 3** Model the greeting:
 - Walk over to a student you’ve prepared ahead of time and say, “Good morning, ____! Let’s greet like Curious George.”
 - That student stands up, and both of you do the monkey sound and motion. Then you return to your spot in the circle and sit down.
 - Ask the class what they noticed about the way you and the student greeted each other.
- 4** Begin the greeting. The student you greeted moves to stand in front of another student in the circle, greets that student, and names a character for the two of them to act out, the way you modeled it. Repeat until everyone has been greeted and only one person is standing.
- 5** The last student standing stays in her spot in the circle and says, “Good morning, everyone! Let’s greet like [character name].” The entire class stands up, says the word or sound, and does the action for this last character.

EXTENSIONS FOR A LATER LANGUAGE ARTS LESSON

- Have students draw a small picture of a favorite book character; then use the pictures to create a graph showing how many students chose each character.
- Invite students to write a sentence or two about why they like a certain character or a connection they have to that character.
